PRESENTATIONS



The South County High School Indoor Drumline came before the Board of Supervisors to be recognized for their accomplishment at the 2017 Winter Guard International world competition. With a score of 91.575, the Indoor Drumline won seventh place in their class, ranking them the top finalist in the Scholastic programs of the Atlantic Indoor Association.

Presentation of the Final Report from the Community Council on Land Use Engagement

The Community Council on Land Use Engagement was created by Chairman Sharon Bulova and was chaired by former Planning Commissioner Walter Alcorn. With the volume of information County residents receive in multiple ways, a message can be lost or the amount of information received is so voluminous as to be overwhelming. We all sometimes hear from residents, particularly in the area of land use, that they were unaware or felt uninformed about a pending decision before the Board which could have an impact on their community. Therefore, the Council was established to produce a set of recommendations that would improve Fairfax County's public outreach and community engagement in the land use and development process.

ADMINISTRATIVE ITEMS

Admin 3: The Board approved the acceptance of White Spruce Way into the State Secondary Street System.

ACTION ITEMS

Action 2: The Board approved the Head Start/Early Head Start Policy Council Bylaws, Self-Assessment Report and Memorandum of Understanding between Policy Council and Board of Supervisors.

Action 3: The Board adopted the updated Board of Supervisors <u>Environmental Vision</u>. Supervisor Storck brought forward environmental concerns from the Richmond Highway Corridor regarding littering and the importance of spring community cleanups.

Action 4: The Board approved the <u>FY 2019 and FY 2020 Funding Priorities for the Consolidated Funding Pool</u>, as recommended by the Consolidated Community Funding Advisory Committee.

Action 6: The Board approved the 2017 Zoning Ordinance Amendment Work Program.

BOARD MATTERS

Supervisor Storck did not present any Board Matters at the June 20, 2017 Board of Supervisors meeting.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Joint Public Hearing on the Proposed Virginia Department of Transportation Six-Year Secondary System Construction Program for Fiscal Year 2018 through 2023 and FY 2018 Budget

The Board approved the proposed Virginia Department of Transportation Six-Year Secondary System Construction Program for Fiscal Years 2018 through 2023, a program that funds the secondary road system (generally smaller, local roads) in the state. However, the program is slowly being phased out by 2021 and is being replaced with the Smart Scale program. There are still a few projects that will be receiving small amounts of funding through the Six-Year Secondary System.

Public Hearing on Proposed Modifications to the Comprehensive Plan Amendment

The Board adopted modifications to the Comprehensive Plan Amendment Process, currently known as Fairfax Forward, to improve public participation in land use planning efforts. The modification will incorporate a new nomination based review cycle, known as the Site-Specific Plan Amendment Process (SSPA) into the Comprehensive Plan Amendment Work Program. The SSPA would draw familiar elements from the prior Area Plans Review (APR) process. The modifications will also replace the "Fairfax Forward" title with "Comprehensive Plan Amendment Process" to provide a dearer understanding when communicating to the general public.

Public Hearing on Amendments to the Code of the County of Fairfax, Chapter 82, Motor Vehicles and Traffic.

The Board adopted Amendments to the *Code of the County of Fairfax*, Chapter 82, Motor Vehicles and Traffic to reflect changes made to the *Code of Virginia* by the 2017 General Assembly.

Public Hearing on a Proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendment Re: Public Facilities and Modifications to Existing Wireless Towers or Base Stations

The Board adopted the proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendments regarding public facilities and modifications to existing wireless towers or base stations which allow Fairfax County to reduce costs and enhance revenues by charging a fee to process 2232 and Section 6409 reviews. The institution of application fees is an

appropriate strategy to recoup some of the costs associated with these reviews and to treat these actions similar to how other zoning reviews and zoning actions are handled by the county.

Public Hearing on a Proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendment Re: Small Cell Facilities

The Board adopted the proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendment regarding small cell facilities as a response to Senate Bill 1282 which was adopted by the 2017 Virginia General Assembly with an effective date of July 1, 2017. This legislation allows localities to require Zoning Administrative approval of a zoning permit for the installation of a small cell facility by a wireless services provider or wireless services infrastructure provider on an existing structure and to charge reasonable fees for the processing of such permits. The proposed amendment would implement Senate Bill 1282.

SHORT-TERM RENTAL

FairfaxCounty is working to create proposed zoning rules for what are calledshort-term rentals. These are homes, condos and apartments rented out for lessthan 30 days on websites like Airbnb, Homeaway, VRBO, FlipKey, or Roomarama.

- Where these rentals would be allowed in the county
- How often they could be rented out
- What types of properties could be rented out


CAMPAIGN AGAINST AGGRESSIVE DRIVING


- Maintain an adequate distance from the vehicle in front of you
