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POAG STREET: HISTORIC LARGE LOSS FIRE

On a cold Saturday morning in February, a fire started in the second-floor trash chute of a multi-use complex that was under construction. The flames would go on to destroy nearly an entire block of property becoming the largest loss fire in the known history of Fairfax County.

On February 8, at approximately, 9:40 a.m., numerous Fairfax County Fire and Rescue units responded for reports of a building fire in the 2800 block of Poag Street in the Groveton area. Arriving within three minutes of being dispatched, crews found an advanced fire coming from the top floor of a five-story building that was under construction.

The building sat in a block with numerous other buildings under construction. As is common with buildings under construction, there was no sprinkler system in place. This combined with extremely windy weather conditions made fighting the fire difficult. Crews worked diligently to extinguish the fire in the buildings under construction while also working to prevent it from spreading to nearby occupied residential buildings.



The fire went to four alarms drawing units from the City of Alexandria Fire Department, Arlington County Fire Department, Prince George's County Fire/EMS Department, and Fort Belvoir Fire and Emergency Services.

The fire spread to five buildings and 14 townhouses that were under construction. All these properties are considered a total loss. The fire damaged and additional 14 townhouses, four single-family homes, five apartment buildings, a commercial building, and 28 vehicles.

Two fire fighters suffered minor injuries and were transported and evaluated at local hospitals. Both have been released. One civilian suffered minor injuries and was transported and evaluated at a local hospital.

Fire Investigators have determined that Saturday's fire in the Groveton area was accidental in nature. The fire started in the second-floor trash chute of the residential portion of a multi-use complex. The cause of the fire was improperly discarded smoking materials.

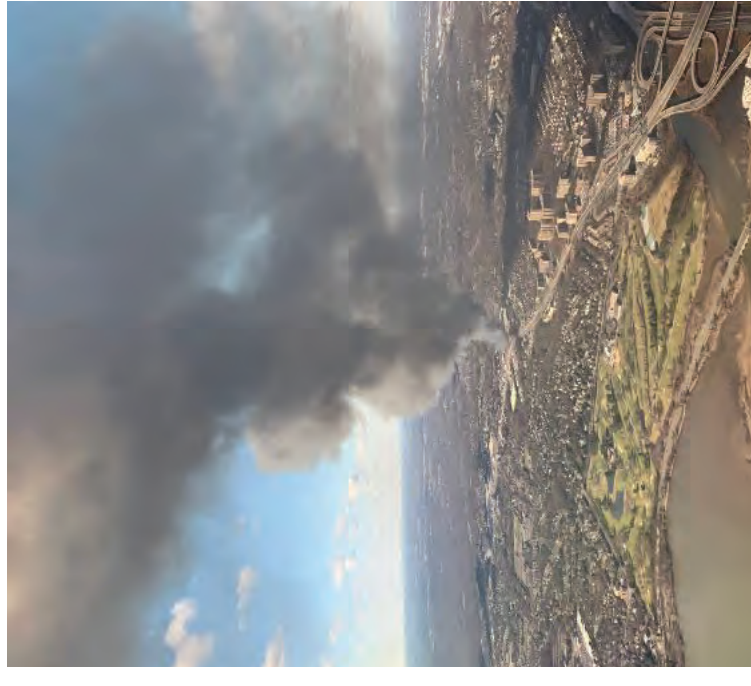
A worker at the construction site noticed a fire in a trash chute. The worker called 911 and attempted to extinguish the fire. The attempts were unsuccessful and the worker evacuated the property.

Damage estimates include the total loss of the main buildings under construction, 14 townhouses, and one trailer. The amount also includes damage to five apartment buildings, 14 additional townhouses, four single family homes, 29 vehicles, and multiple pieces of construction equipment.

Damage total as a result of the fire is \$48,171,075.



The five-story building was under construction and, as is common, there was no sprinkler system in place. The fire caused over \$48 million in damages. The largest loss fire in known Fairfax County history.



Smoke from the four-alarm fire could be seen throughout the Washington Metropolitan area. Plumes could be seen from miles away in Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia.



The Poag Street fire was large enough that it was mentioned on national news networks. All local television and radio news outlets were present at the scene as crews continued to fight the fire. Fire Chief Butler and Captain Ron Kuley briefed all media outlets two times - once while fire fighters were actively engaged in attacking the fire and after the fire had been brought under control.

PANDEMIC

The emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic in March altered life and emergency medical service operations worldwide.

FCFRD learned to adapt and overcome some of the greatest challenges in its history.



By mid March the COVID-19 virus that had been dominating news headlines as it spread like wildfire across the globe began to grow roots in Virginia and states throughout the country. As lockdown restrictions were put in place, businesses shut their doors, and kids and adults began to attend work and school from their homes, FCFRD leadership, career, civilian, and volunteer staff increased operations. Creating new policies and procedures designed to keep providers safe was difficult as information about the new virus changed seemingly by the hour. Meetings were held daily to create action plans for acquiring much needed PPE. Anxiety rose among residents - an emotion felt among many in the department as well.

Despite this uncertainty, FCFRD members, particularly field personnel, rose to meet the challenges

they encountered daily. Doing so while facing a pandemic the size of which had not been seen for over a century was certainly not easy. However, FCFRD providers continued to go above and beyond to provide emergency services and medical care to its communities.

This year has been amongst the most complicated and polarizing in recent history. Yet, FCFRD staff have risen above these challenges - inventing new methods and ideas to help successfully move the department into the new year.



In order to prepare for the unknowns of the global pandemic, it was decided that RC146 and RC147 would graduate early to assist with staffing levels and the increased load brought by COVID-19. This was the first time in the department's 70 year history this had been done and served as an example of the unprecedented actions being taken everyday to combat COVID-19.



With schools switching to virtual learning and senior centers closing, FCFRD life safety educators had to come up with new ways to reach the school-age and elderly populations. They created videos, joined teachers and students in their virtual classrooms, and conducted outreach sessions to older adults via Zoom. They developed many innovative and creative solutions to ensure safety messages and information continued to reach our at-risk population.



In 2020, Community Risk Reduction began hosting CPR Resuscitation Reunions to reunite a CPR patient with the person who provided them with bystander CPR and the FCFRD crews who provided them care. As the pandemic grew, CRR quickly switched gears and took the reunions virtual. While everyone wished they could have been in person, these events continued to highlight the importance of bystander CPR and early CPR and AED intervention in the survival of patients in cardiac events.



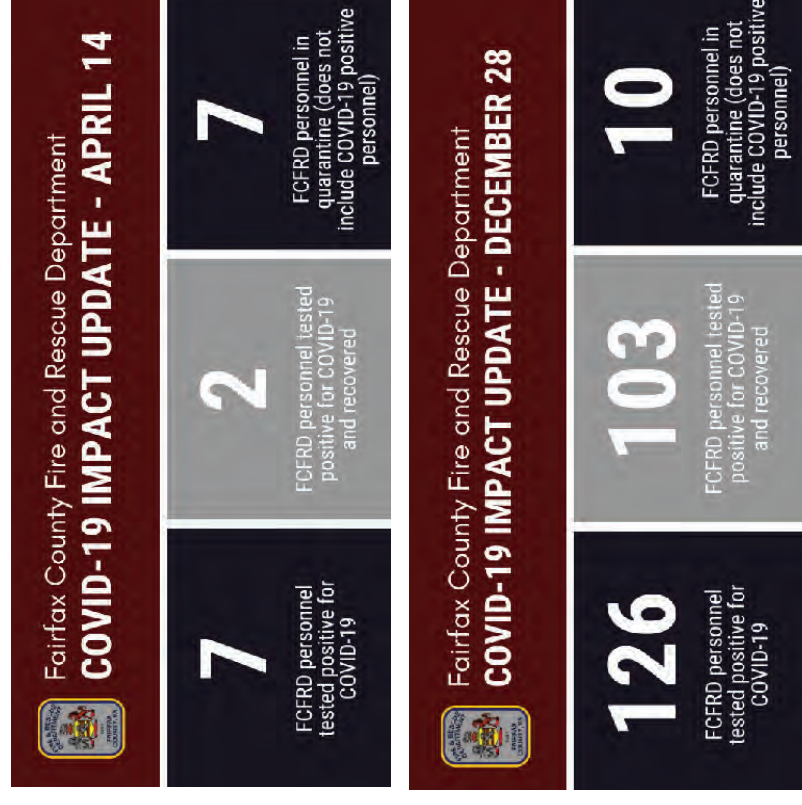
For EMS Week in May numerous EMT and paramedics were asked what it meant to them to be a medical provider during the pandemic. Their answers, along with a picture of the provider, were featured on the department's social media platforms.



The pandemic altered the way recruiting was conducted across the fire service. One of the ways FCFRD adjusted was to host virtual recruitment events via Zoom. The Recruitment Section also hosted virtual events for military members where they could speak with a recruitment expert and a FCFRD member who had formerly served in the military.



Recruit Class 148 began its training in October 2020. The first recruit class to have the entirety of its training conducted during the pandemic, many new precautions and procedures were put in place to help keep both recruits and instructors safe and healthy.



FCFRD has published weekly COVID-19 statistics for the department every Monday since the start of the pandemic. As of the last report in 2020, 126 members of the department had tested positive for COVID-19.

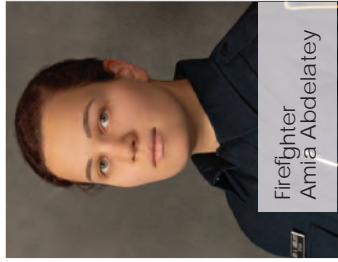

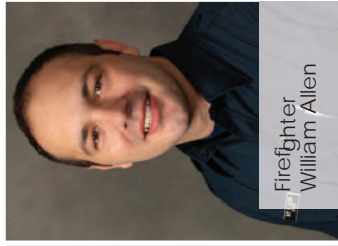
146th & 147th RECRUIT SCHOOLS



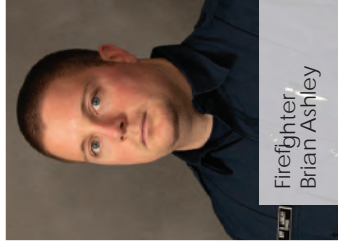

LIFE-YEARS ADDED

Sometimes this final status cannot be determined for days, even weeks.

2020 was an unprecedented year.

Despite these challenges, the Life-Years Added number, too, is unprecedented.

The final tally for 2020:

- 4189 Life-years added
- 130 Individual patients.

We are grateful to each and every one of you for your efforts in rising to the challenge - on behalf of the mission, the patients and community that we serve.

Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department Launches PulsePoint

For over a year, personnel within Fairfax County Fire and Rescue have been hard at work preparing for the launch of PulsePoint throughout Fairfax County. PulsePoint is a mobile app that alerts registered, CPR-trained bystanders to a cardiac event nearby that may require CPR.

When a 911 call is received by the Department of Public Safety Communications reporting someone likely needing CPR, emergency resources will be dispatched as normal. Simultaneously, PulsePoint software will send an alert to nearby registered, CPR-trained residents and provide the location of a nearby AED.

PulsePoint notifies users of CPR incidents in public places, such as shopping centers, gyms, restaurants, etc. It does not notify users of CPR incidents in private residences, such as homes or apartments. Personnel should be aware that members of the public may be notified by the app of a public location CPR. The public may be on scene prior to FCFRD arrival or may arrive after units are on scene. Personnel should thank bystanders for their willingness to assist and, if appropriate, fill out an FRD-399A (Good Samaritan Citizen Exposure Intake).

A soft launch for PulsePoint began in October 2020. The purpose of the soft launch was to:

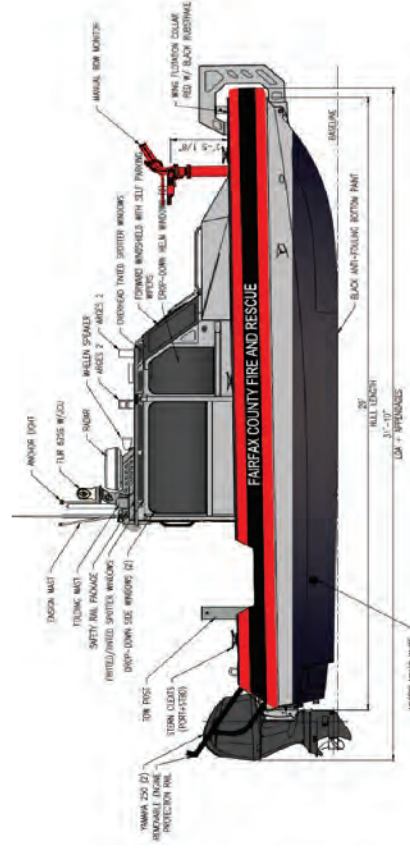
- Conduct the final testing of the application

- to prepare for the full community launch.
- Encourage FRD personnel to download the PulsePoint Responder app to their personal device and follow FCFRD.
- Encourage personnel to download the PulsePoint AED app to their personal device.
- Aid in building the public AED registry in Fairfax County. Personnel who add an AED to the registry should add their assignment (i.e., FS-440/A) to the end of the content in the "AED Location Description." This will help administrators verify that FCFRD personnel added the AED.

PulsePoint was announced to the community on January 11, 2021. The formal launch included a video from the fire chief and county partners, a social media campaign, and local media outreach.

FIRE BOAT 420 IN SERVICE

Over the summer, the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department (FCFRD) put its new fire boat in service. Fire Boat 420 is housed at Fire Station 20, Gunston.



The boat underwent sea trials before arriving in Fairfax County in June 2020. Once it arrived at Fire Station 20, crews were able to familiarize themselves with the new boat. They also took it out on the water to train before was put into service in July 2020.

FCFRD contracted with Metal Shark to build and deliver a 29-ft. boat with (2)-250 HP outboard motors. Fire Boat 420 has a fire pump and monitor to fight fire along with an enclosed cabin to carry a crew of four fire fighters and provide care for an immobilized patient.

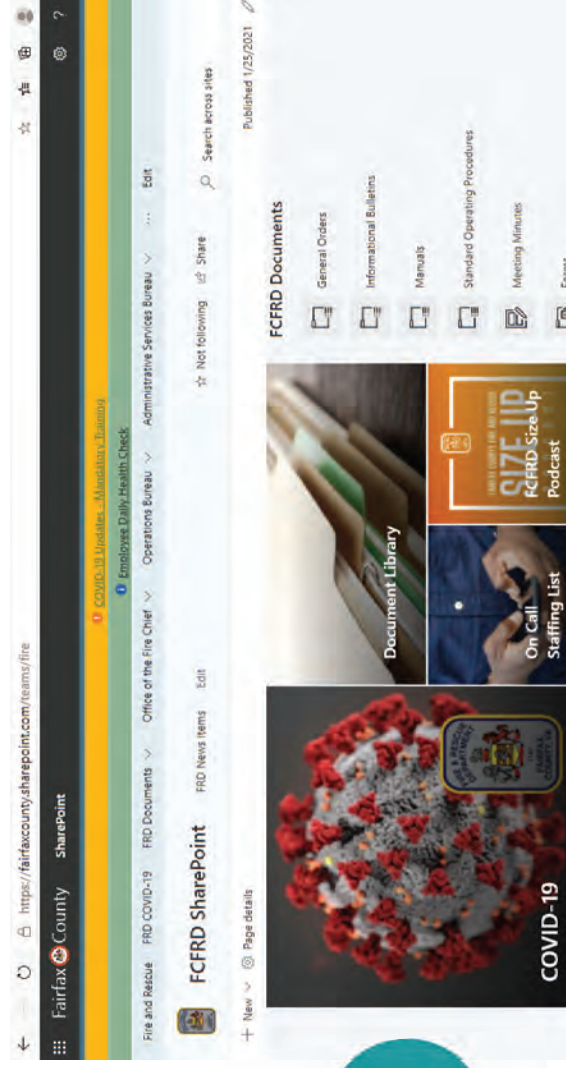

SharePoint is updated on a regular basis by administrators within each section of the department. Additionally, a department news update is published bi-weekly. Personnel can also click through to FireNet from SharePoint. SharePoint does not replace FireNet but rather acts as a landing for many of the most current and crucial documents and information within the department.

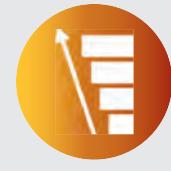

Fire Investigations *Section*

In April 2020, Fairfax County's Fire and Hazardous Materials Investigative Services Section transitioned into the Fire Investigations Section (FIS). Despite the name change, the mission of the section remains the same: to determine the origin and cause of all fires or explosions that occur in Fairfax County, to investigate the illicit release of hazardous materials, and to enforce the Statewide Fire Prevention Code as well as the Virginia Criminal Code. Upon completion of an investigation, FIS assists with data collection for other agencies within Fairfax County and contributes to national databases such as the U.S. Consumer Products Safety Commission, the ATF's Bomb and Arson Tracking System, and the National Insurance Crime Bureau.

FIS is currently comprised of 12 shift investigators, four Captains, and eight Lieutenants who work a rotating 12-hour schedule. The investigators provide 24-hour coverage, including nights and weekends.

Additionally, a Captain and Battalion Chief are assigned to a day work schedule to facilitate the section's daily operations.

Each investigator has completed a variety of training including meeting NFPA's Professional Qualifications for Fire Investigators (1033) and the Professional Qualifications for Fire Inspectors (1031). All must successfully complete the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development's C.O.R.E. class and a Law Enforcement Academy.

Currently, an investigator is dispatched on all RIT Level 1 requests and can be requested through the Department of Public Safety Communications (DPSC) for a variety of situations including (but not limited to) suspicious fires, the manufacturing of explosive devices, and tampering with fire department equipment or personnel. During the evening hours and on weekends, FIS also handles code enforcement and the documentation of impaired fire protection systems. A complete list of events that require FIS notification can be found at S.O.P. 08.04.01.

In an effort to bridge the gap between Operations and FIS, the section will periodically publish articles pertaining to recent trends or interesting cases.

In this first edition, Lieutenant Coston will discuss how communications lines have become energized causing multiple house fires.

Energized Communications Wires an Unexpected Cause of Fires

During the month of June 2020, FIS responded to two unique electrical fires. Communication wires such as telephone cable and coaxial cords are rated and can carry a small amount of voltage. In both recent fires, an underground communication cable encountered a high voltage power line.

The first event was in company 14's area. An underground communication line was struck by a piece of rebar that was driven into the ground by a contractor. Subsequently, this line came in contact with a nearby power line causing the communication cable to become over energized. The electrical current traveled through the communication lines and into the communication boxes of nearby townhouses. This event led to two townhouses having active fires and two additional townhomes experiencing arcing and smoke.

The second event was in company 38's area. A house fire was dispatched, and units marked on scene with a fire in the attic. Upon the early fire investigation phase, it was determined that a coaxial cable was still energized. This coaxial cable was in the attic and in the area of fire origin. Fire units had secured the power to the structure during the initial fire fighting phase. The power company was called back to the scene to check the status of the power. During the power company's investigation, it was determined that a coaxial cable leading to the communication box was energized. This line was traced to the front yard where an electrical box was located. The power company determined that the communication company had grounded their line into the high voltage power line.



These two events occurred within days of each other. Luckily, no civilian or fire fighter injuries occurred. The Fire Investigation Section would like to remind personnel that all wires are capable of carrying an electrical current and can become energized by alternate power sources even after power is controlled.

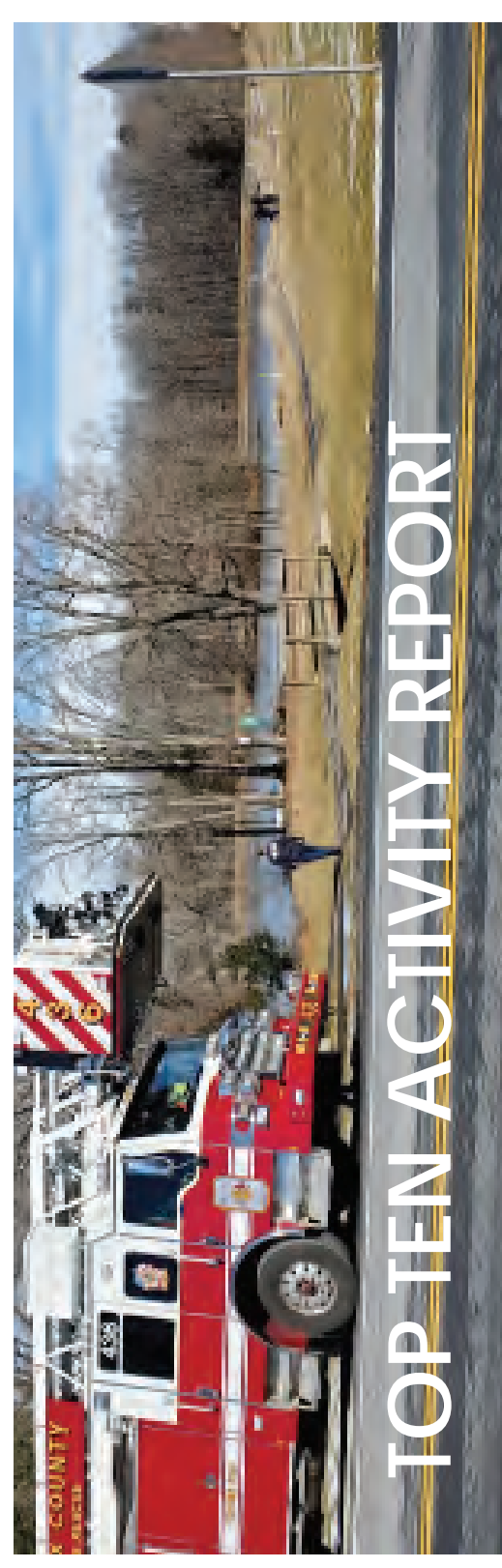
