• It's been a beautiful spring, with flowers exploding into bloom everywhere. Especially striking are the trees, bushes and daffodils on Braddock Rd., Route 236 and Burke Lake Rd. They are the legacy of *Adele Breaux*, Coordinator of the *Braddock District Tree Planting Project* since 1990. The *Tree Project* is funded through contributions from individuals and organizations, leveraged with matching funds from State and environmental grants. Braddock lost our beloved "Tree Lady" in February when she succumbed to cancer. Adele was such a bright star; her light will be sorely missed. She leaves behind however much beauty. The project continues under the capable leadership of *John Fee* and dedicated volunteers who can be found attired in flame orange vests as they prune, mulch and weed in the medians of our main roads. To plant a tree or to volunteer, contact John Fee through my office at 425-9300.

• In April the Board of Supervisors adopted the County's **FY 2000 Budget**. In contrast to previous years, when we struggled to recover from the severe recession early in the 90's, we were able to catch up on some critical needs: school construction, public safety, transportation, human services, trails/sidewalks, storm drainage. Increased revenue came from higher commercial real estate assessments and assistance from the General Assembly (lottery money for schools, some funding for public safety). As a result of strict *Budget Guidelines* and some tough decisions four years ago, when a number of services were reduced or eliminated, the County has attained a stable fiscal equilibrium.

• During these last months of the 90's I hope you'll join me for a number of pleasant activities my office, along with neighborhood volunteers, has been planning. On Friday evenings throughout the summer, we will be holding *Braddock Nights Concerts* in two beautiful Braddock District parks – Lake Accotink in Springfield and Royal Lake in Burke/Fairfax. The setting is Wolf Trap-like, only free! Bring a picnic dinner and lawn chairs and enjoy some great homegrown talent. On <u>Saturday, June 26th</u>, we are hosting (along with Media General Cable) a *special Toon Disney Movie Night* at Lake Accotink. Plan to bring your children or grandchildren for this *once only* event. See *Braddock Nights* program details inside.

Most homes in Braddock District were built between the 1950's and early 1980's. We do, however, have a few historic buildings in our midst. One of these, *Wakefield Chapel* in Annandale will celebrate its 100th birthday this year. My office is working with neighbors, including *Vic Danisavage* (who led the charge 25 years ago to save the Chapel) to plan a unique celebration. Activities will include wedding reenactments conducted by "*Reverend Wakefield*" and will feature some great music, food and children's activities. My office is seeking old photographs and memorabilia of the Wakefield area that could be included in a commemorative display inside the Chapel. If you have such material or if you would like to volunteer to help with the celebration, please contact my office. I hope you will join us on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>October 10th</u>.

• On the back page of this newsletter is information about my **Spring Town Meeting** (June 15th, 7:30 P.M. at Little Run Elementary School.) The program is a look at *The Big Picture* and will feature briefings on three Major Transportation Projects of interest to Braddock District residents. I hope you'll take advantage of this opportunity to hear from officials from The Virginia Department of Transportation about *The Woodrow Wilson Bridge, The Mixing Bowl* and plans to widen *The Beltway*. Because this is an election year, this Town Meeting will *not* be televised on Channel 16. Additionally, to avoid taking advantage of my incumbency I will *not* be publishing a newsletter this fall. Please let me know if you have any comments or questions or if there is any way my office can be of assistance to you.

ROADWORKS UPDATE

Roberts Rd. Flyover - Construct overpass over the Norfolk Southern Railroad tracks (State Project) Along with the overpass, there will be significant safety improvements at both approaches to the bridge. South of the tracks, the conflicting turning movements on Roberts Parkway at Premier Court, the Burke VRE Station and the Burke Commons Community Center will be corrected with a single access point controlled by a traffic signal. North of the tracks, there will be dual right turn lanes onto NE bound New Guinea Road with a traffic signal at Roberts and New Guinea Roads. To avoid prolonged disruption to the Colony Park community, VDOT will widen New Guinea Road adjacent to Colony Park as a part of this project.

When the flyover is completed, the traffic signal located at the old traffic circle will be eliminated and Old Guinea Road will dead end north of the tracks. VDOT is evaluating the need for a traffic signal at Colony View Dr. Design of the bridge is complete. Construction bid advertisement in May '99. Project starts in August '99.

Roberts Rd. Extension - Complete a two lane segment of Roberts Rd. from Collingham Dr. to north of Colony View Dr. (State Project - 0.4 mile) Construction is completed. The Braddock District Tree Planting Project, in conjunction with the County Office of Transportation, received an enhancement grant to provide some fencing and trees for residents adjacent to the project. Fence installation will be completed this summer. Trees will be planted during this fall. Speed limit signs are posted and enforcement has begun. A corridor study of intersections along Roberts Rd. is underway.

Guinea Rd. - Roberts Rd. to Pommeroy Dr. (State <u>Project - 1.5 miles</u>) Widen from two to four lanes. Funded for preliminary design in late 2001.

<u>Guinea Rd.</u> – Braddock Rd. to Braeburn Dr. (State Project - 1.6 miles) Widen from two to four lanes. Added to State's Six Year Plan in '98. Preliminary design anticipated in late 2002.

Burke Centre Parkway - From Marshall Pond Rd. to Burke Lake Rd. (County/State Project - 0.87 mile) Widen from two to four lanes. Final design completed. Construction goes to bid in August '99. **<u>Rt. 123 (Ox Rd.)</u>** - From Burke Lake Rd. to the Occoquan River (State project - 7 miles) Widen Ox Rd. to four lanes (with right-of-way for a future six lanes). Public hearing on design held in March '99. Land acquisition underway. Construction for some segments tentatively set for late 2002.

<u>*Rt. 123 (Ox Rd.) at Braddock Rd.* (State Project)</u> Extend existing NB Ox Rd. right turn lane with curb & gutter continuously to the University Shopping Center entrance onto Ox Rd. Construction is set for fall '99.

Shirley Gate Rd., Extended - From Braddock Rd. to the Fairfax County Parkway (State Project - 0.9 mile) This project will connect Shirley Gate Rd. to the Fairfax County Parkway. It's funded for preliminary design in the State's Six-Year Plan in late 2002.

<u>Rolling Rd. At Burke Lake Rd</u>. (State Project) Funding has been secured for the addition of a right turn lane on NB Rolling at Burke Lake Rd. Project expected to start this summer.

I-95/395/495 Interchange Project - (State Project). Eight-year construction project to fix the "mixing bowl" began this spring. Several small congestion management projects to facilitate traffic flow in the area were approved. Two are in Braddock: **Backlick Rd**. - add a left turn lane from NB Backlick to WB Leesville Blvd., **Backlick Rd**. - extend left turn lane from SB Backlick to EB Edsall Rd. *Turn lanes are meant to unclog through lanes on Backlick and not to encourage traffic onto neighborhood streets*. The congestion management plan will also encourage car pooling and transit use. For more information go to www.vdot.state.va.us and www.springfieldinterchange.com.

I-95/I-495 Capital Beltway Widening - (State Study) Major study of the entire Capital Beltway in Virginia from the Woodrow Wilson Bridge to the American Legion Bridge is complete. Phase 2, preliminary engineering and environmental documentation of the alternatives, is to be completed by late '99. Phase 2 is from the Springfield Interchange project to the American Legion Bridge. The first VDOT public information workshop is June 8, 1999 at 7 P.M. at Poe Middle School, 7000 Cindy Ln, Annandale. *Chet McLaren* of North Springfield ably represents Braddock on the Beltway Improvement Citizen Advisory Task Force.

VRE Springs into Summer with New Schedule

In May, to offer relief to commuters during the "Mixing Bowl" construction, Virginia Railway Express introduced *new and improved schedules*. Riders on the Manassas Line now have the option of going home a bit earlier or a bit later. The first train of the evening leaving Union Station has a new departure time of 3:45 PM. The last evening train will now leave at 6:50 PM.

VRE has enjoyed a **16% increase in ridership** over the past year. VRE's renewed popularity is attributable in part to: a 95% average on-time performance; plenty of free parking at VRE stations; new Café Cars; more employers offering *Metrochek;* helpful, service-oriented VRE crews; and, of course an opportunity to avoid traffic congestion on our crowded main roads. TRANSIT NEWS

On June 20th changes will go into effect to simplify and integrate transit fares in the region. These changes result not only in some *reduced fares* but include several other enhancements designed to *simplify transit use and to encourage ridership*.

WMATA approved changes to eliminate zone changes throughout the Metro system and established a \$2.00 express fare on 28 Metrobus routes. In Braddock District these include: 17-B,H,K,L,M, 18-E,G,H,P and 29-E,G,H,X. Other changes include the elimination of bus-to-bus transfer charges for a time period of 120 minutes throughout the entire system and the shortening of the peak fare time period. A one-day Metrobus pass, valid throughout the system, is available on non-express routes for \$2.50.

The **FAIRFAX CONNECTOR** has adopted similar changes including unlimited bus-to-bus transfers for 120 minutes, the elimination of zone charges and a \$2.00 express fares on some routes. The FAIRFAX CONNECTOR honors the Metrobus one-day pass.

Fairfax County is moving forward with plans to install photo monitoring devices at a number of intersections in the County. This program, authorized by the Virginia General Assembly, allows jurisdictions to ticket drivers who don't stop for red lights. Violations are punishable by a fine of up to \$50 but will not result in points on the operator's driving record. Violations are presumed to have been committed by the registered owner of the vehicle and a summons is sent to that individual. If the owner was *not* operating the vehicle at the time of the offense, the owner may submit an affidavit stating this fact or appear in court to testify. County staff is currently evaluating locations for the devices based on high traffic accident statistics due to red light running. Installation at approximately ten locations should be in place by this fall.

During the past several years, I have spoken with many community groups about this program. While some people are adverse to what they consider to be "big brother" aspects of the program, a clear majority expressed support for using technology to assist with a growing safety problem. Photo Red Light is now in use in the Cities of Fairfax and Alexandria, Arlington County, and the Town of Vienna.

Braddock District Spot Traffic Improvements

(County Projects) - Three "quick fix" traffic improvements recommended by the Braddock District Council of Community Associations and Braddock residents were approved:

<u>Construct right turn lane on northbound Rt. 123 at</u> <u>Middlegate Dr</u>. Construction was recently completed. The developer of the new community Keys Crossing contributed toward the cost of construction.

<u>Construct right turn lane from Wakefield Chapel Rd.</u> to eastbound Rt. 236. Funding was identified this year to initiate the project. Construction bid advertisement in late '99 with construction to be completed in the first half of 2000.

Extend right turn lane from westbound Braddock Rd. to northbound Rt. 123 (Chain Bridge Rd.) Funding source and timing of project are to be determined.

TRAILS

Woodland Way Project: this 400 ft. segment from Woodland Meadows to Fleming Drive will complete the sidewalk along Woodland Way, providing a link for walkers to Canterbury Woods Elementary School, Kings Park Shopping Center and Kings Park Library. Design and land acquisition completed. Construction scheduled for summer '99.

Guinea Road Project: west side of Guinea from Braddock Rd. north to Rutherford Park. This 3,400 ft. project will be built in conjunction with the widening of Guinea Rd. (planning to begin in late 2002)

Long Branch Stream Valley Park Project: This stream valley park, located north of Braddock Rd., runs from east of Wakefield Park to the west of Olde Creek Elementary School. A trail exists from Wakefield Park to east of Woodland Way. This proposed 1.23-mile trail extension would be from Candance Ln to Olley Ln. In April I hosted a community meeting to provide information about the proposal to area residents. The Park Authority, which will manage the project, is making revisions to incorporate residents' input into the plans. The next phase will be a walk of the project to visit with adjacent residents sometime later this year.

LAKE ACCOTINK PARK RENOVATION

Park visitors will discover major improvements when visiting Lake Accotink this spring. There is a new pavilion, featuring seating for 200, a large grill and the convenience of attached restrooms and adjacent accessible parking. A short path leads from the pavilion to new basketball and sand volleyball courts. There is also a new parking lot with more spaces and a wider turnaround area. Call 324-8732 to reserve the new pavilion.

SCHOOLS

Oakview and Fairview Elementary Schools renewal should be finished by the end of 2000. Laurel Ridge Elementary and Lake Braddock Secondary Schools are in the planning stage for renewal with construction in 2001. Annandale High School renovation should be completed in 2002.

INSTALLMENT PAYMENTS FOR COUNTY TAXES

Beginning May 3rd taxpayers now have the option of paying their real estate and/or personal property taxes in advance on an installment basis. The program was adopted in response to citizen requests for such a program, which would allow for smaller payments over time instead of one lump sum payment. County property owners may now sign an agreement with the County and NationsBank authorizing a specific dollar amount to be debited from his or her account on a periodic basis and electronically transferred to the County. The funds are posted as a prepayment to the citizen's specific property tax account. A slight service fee of \$0.38 per debit transaction would be paid to NationsBank for the service. YOUR COUNTY GOVERNMENT IN ACTION

Board of Supervisors meetings are aired live on Channel 16 on the Mondays when the Board meets (approximately every other Monday) starting at 9:30 A.M. A replay of the morning session is aired the next day (Tuesday) starting at 8:00 P.M. The entire meeting is replayed on Saturday beginning at 10:00 A.M. I believe that it's important for people to have a forum to present issues of concern to the Board. Several years ago, at my suggestion, the Board established Citizen's Public Comment Time. At the end of the last Board meeting scheduled each month, up to ten speakers may sign up to address the Board for three minutes. Speakers may comment on any issue except issues under litigation, issues that have already been scheduled for a public hearing, personnel matters or personal attacks. To give as many people as possible an opportunity to speak, individuals may address the Board only once during a six-month period. You may sign up to speak by calling the Clerk to the Board at 324-3151.

1999 ELECTIONS

It's a busy election year in Fairfax County! On November 2nd we will be voting for our General Assembly, County Board of Supervisors, School Board, Northern Virginia Natural Resources Conservation Service members, Sheriff, Clerk of the Court and Commonwealth's Attorney.

Voters will also have the opportunity to vote for a School Bond Referendum that will provide funds for public school construction. These bonds will pay for new schools and additions and renovations for older schools. Currently, the proposed referendum includes funds for renovations at Annandale High School and planning funds for the renewal of Laurel Ridge Elementary and Lake Braddock Secondary schools

Voter registration is open year round except during the 29 days prior to a general or primary election or the 13 days prior to a special election. The last day to register for this year's general election is October 4th. You may register by mail (applications are available from my office), at VA DMV locations, public assistance agencies and military recruitment offices.
